Day 1-Keynote Speakers



Prof Stephen Krashen

Title: The Power of Popular Literature in Language Education

Abstract: During the last 45 years, evidence supporting the Input Hypothesis has been growing: We acquire not by "study" but by understanding what we read and hear. There is also increasing

acknowledgement of the importance of fiction, including "popular" fiction. Those who read more fiction do better on reading, writing, and vocabulary tests and have more knowledge of a wide variety of topics. The path to high levels of literacy and knowledge may be a path of pleasure.

Bio-note: Stephen Krashen has published over 500 articles and a dozen books in literacy, language acquisition, neurolinguistics, and bilingual education. He no longer writes books because nobody can afford them, but many of his articles and books are available for free download at sdkrashen.com.



Dr Mick King

Title: One Person; Two Perspectives: An Auto Ethnographic Reflection on Teacher Evaluation

Abstract: I have juggled between roles as the evaluator and the evaluated in my career. I have also researched the evaluation of experienced teachers, driven by my misgivings about how I was being

evaluated and how I was asked to evaluate others. This session acts as an autoethnographic reflection of my lived experiences in both roles and how they match my own and others' research findings.

Bio-note : In his 30 plus year career in Europe and the Gulf, Dr Mick King has managed, lectured, taught, and trained (teachers) in TESOL, education, and management. His service to the profession includes board membership and review work for journals and symposiums, and he has disseminated his research regionally and internationally.

Dr Christine Coombe

Title: Professionalizing Your English Language Teaching

Abstract: Being a teaching professional is not simply about having the proper teaching credentials and being in good academic standing. It involves a commitment to being innovative and transformative

in the classroom and helping students and colleagues achieve their goals. In this plenary session, the presenter will review the literature on professionalism and present definitions of what it means to be a professional. Other content to be covered includes the myths associated with professionalism and the challenges ELT educators face when being professional. General and field-specific strategies for improving one's professionalism will also be shared.

Bio-note: Dr Christine Coombe has a PhD in Foreign/Second Language Education from The Ohio State University and is an Associate Professor of General Studies at Dubai Men's College, Higher Colleges of Technology in the UAE. Christine has co-authored/edited 54 volumes on assessment/testing, research, teacher effectiveness, leadership and task-based teaching and learning. Her most recent volumes are Professionalizing Your English Language Teaching (2020), Policy Development in TESOL and Multilingualism (2021), Challenges in English Language Testing Worldwide (2021) and The Assessment of L2 Written English across the MENA Region (2021). Dr Coombe served as TESOL International Association President (2011-2012) and as a member of the Board of Directors (2005-2007; 2010-2013). Christine received the British Council's International Assessment Award for 2013. Her most recent honors were being named to TESOL's 50@50, which "recognizes professionals who have made significant contributions to the TESOL profession within the past 50 years." In 2018 she received the Alatis Award for exemplary service to TESOL. Most recently, she was named to the US Department of State's 30@30 list, which recognizes the top 30 English Language Specialists over the past 30 years.

Dr Christel Broady

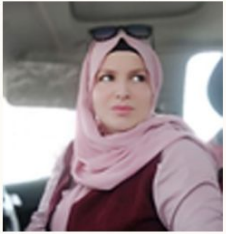
Title: Brain-Based Dos and Dont's of English Language Teaching

Abstract : In this session, participants will learn what English teachers need to know about how first and second language literacy is formed in the human brain, what they can do to maximize

2nd language mastery, and what they should NOT do. They will learn that a brain-based approach is necessary to allow learners to learn to their best depending on their developmental level and age.

Bio-note: Dr Christel Broady, Endowed chair, professor, and Director of the ESL teacher Education at Georgetown College in the USA, is an international leader in language teaching. Over the past 20 years, she has served in many leadership roles with TESOL International (member of the TESOL Board of Directors 2018-2021), Kentucky (president of KYTESOL), and the Southeast TESOL. Her list of domestic and international leadership roles, publications, keynotes, plenary talks, presentations, awards, and recognition is extensive. In addition, as an English Language Specialist for the US Department of State, Christel conducts assignments abroad. These activities and being an English learner herself allow her to learn about other countries from the ELT professionals, governments, and citizens.

Dr Fouzia Rouaghe

Title: English as a Medium of Instruction at the Algerian University: Fiction or Reality?

Abstract: Due to the French colonization of Algeria for 132 years, speakers of French as a second language outnumber speakers of English. Since English is not spoken outside the classroom,

it remains a language of an artificial setting. Though it has become the language of science and technology, it opens new horizons on the international and scientific levels. The introduction of English to higher education as a Medium of instruction (EMI) in some fields was not welcomed by many students who found it challenging to adapt to the new system. With the arrival of the Minister of Higher Education Tayeb Bouzid in 2019, there was an attempt to drop French from higher education and be substituted by English, but it could, by no means, happen magically overnight. Students still struggle with the language confusion policy in Algeria, and there is a need for a slow but sure change. The inclusion of English as the medium of instruction may be implemented in the next generations in specific fields. Her presentation will focus on the need for preparatory schools for ESP and science and technology. She will also highlight how entry tests, exits tests, and qualified teachers are sine qua non for the success of the operation.

Bio-note: Dr Fouzia Rouaghe is an associate professor at University of Mohamed Lamine Debaghine Sétif. She holds a doctorate and is a CELTA Qualified Teacher Trainer. She has a vast teaching experience and has an expertise in teaching modules like oral expression, English for Specific Purposes, academic writing, grammar, phonology, cross-cultural communication.

Title: Quality Education: A Key Factor to Effective Teaching and Learner Empowerment in the 21st Century

Abstract: Today, technological developments and easier access to education have raised expectations from schools and colleges. In the 21st Century, schools not only teach knowledge but they prepare students for

the real world. Quality education focuses on the whole-person approach and the learners' well-being regarding social, emotional, mental, physical, and cognitive development. Meanwhile, effective teaching principles aim to affect the learners' lives and academic careers positively. This plenary aims to introduce effective teaching and its impact on learners' empowerment.

Bio-note: Khalil Motallebzadeh is an associate professor at Tabaran Institute of Higher Education, Iran. He is a researcher in teacher education, e-learning, and language assessment and the editor-in-chief of the International Journal of Language Testing. He is also an accredited international master trainer and trainer assessor since 2008.

Title: L1 Phonology in L2 Class: Revisiting Pronunciation Targets and Instructions

Abstract: Teaching the pronunciation of English to foreign language learners was argued to have been based on native-speaker norms, particularly the Received Pronunciation (RP) and General American (GA).

This presentation negotiates the targets of teaching the pronunciation of English to Arab learners. It provides recommendations about the role of learners' L1 phonology (over imitating native speaker norms) in improving the intelligibility of Arab speakers to native and non-native users of English in cross-cultural communication.

Bio-note: Dr Wafa Zoghbor is an Associate Professor in Applied Linguistics at Zayed University, UAE. She is an accredited international trainer in strategic planning and has published several studies on Phonology and ELF in international journals and has edited several books, reviewed many journal articles, and is on the editorial board of international journals.

Dr Jamila Al Siyabi

Title: What do students say about teachers' written feedback on their academic writing?

Abstract: The paper session highlights undergraduate students' metalinguistic understanding of their EFL academic writing and looks into their perspectives of their teachers' written feedback

on their writing. It will begin by featuring how metalinguistic understanding is theorized and defined. Then, based on the data analysis of semi-structured interviews with ten students, the session will explore what concepts students brought up in their verbal articulation of writing-related concepts and how they perceived the written feedback they received from their writing teachers on their scripts. The session will also include relevant implications drawn from the analysis of how students verbalize their understanding of their writing and how they see writing and teacher feedback on their academic writing.

Keywords: EFL academic writing-metalinguistic understanding-perceptions- written feedback

Bio-note: Dr Jamila Al-Siyabi teaches at the Centre for Preparatory Studies at Sultan Qaboos University. She has a MA in Applied Linguistics from Queensland University, Australia, an MSc in Educational Research from Exeter University, UK and a PhD in Education from Exeter University, UK, in cohesion and coherence in EFL academic writing. She is the author and co-author of several publications, and she presented at national and international symposiums. Her main research interests include writing, semantics communication and culture.

Title: How A Global Pandemic Changed English Language Teachers' Career Paths

Abstract: The extraordinary changes brought on by a global pandemic demanded that English language teachers address emergency measures and pivot to new online teaching from familiar face-to-face settings. Her keynote address

will highlight various tips and techniques that will help learn more about the recent career path journeys of three teachers who demonstrated remarkable resilience and persistent adaptability to emergency measures and experienced rough phases during their tenure.

Bio-note: Dr Liz England enjoys semi-retirement following 35+ years in full-time graduate language teacher education. She is currently fully engaged professionally and accepts short-term assignments and publishing projects (currently working on a book with Routledge), alongside her work with TESOL International Association leadership positions, currently as Founder, TESOL Career Path Development Professional Learning Network.



Prof Carol Evans- Pro Vice Chancellor at Griffith University, Australia

Title: Research Teaching Nexus

Abstract: Professor Evans will firstly highlight the importance of an integrated team approach to research and education. Secondly, she will focus on what constitutes high quality pedagogical research and the importance of team

development to support shared understandings of quality. Lastly, she will share insights from her various roles in developing pedagogical research capacity at scale and key learning points from her role as Editor-in-Chief of Higher Education Pedagogies journal.

Bio-note: Carol is a global leader in research-informed inclusive assessment practices and pedagogy. Before moving back to the UK, Professor Evans was Pro Vice-Chancellor (Learning and Teaching) at Griffith University (Australia) and recent positions she has held prior to that include Chair of Higher Education and Academic Lead of HEFi at the University of Birmingham, and Professor and Co-Director of Southampton's Centre for Higher Education. She is currently a non-executive board member at the University of Bournemouth, an honorary visiting professor at Cardiff University and professorial fellow at the University of Southampton in addition to being editor-in-chief of Higher Education Pedagogies. She is an avid researcher and her most recent work focuses on disability inclusion for Transforming Access and Student Outcomes (TASO).

Title: Transforming Teaching and Learning through Research: EAR and SoTL in the ELT Classroom

Abstract: It becomes a prerequisite to enhancing teachers' teaching and research skills to transform teaching and learning. Exploratory Action Research (EAR) and Scholarship of Teaching and

Learning (SoTL) can allow ELT practitioners to actively and critically research their practices and contexts, to analyse students' learning process.

The keynote address will focus on institutionalising EAR and SoTL that makes the research a part of teaching while rejecting the conventional belief that research might not be relevant to teaching and that it is the sole responsibility of researchers. It will also define EAR and SoTL with examples, discuss their benefits, and outline the procedures for conducting the discussed types.

Bio-note: Dr Hashil Al-Saadi is a language lecturer, researcher and research trainer at Sultan Qaboos University and holds a PhD in Education from the University of Sheffield, UK. His research interests include learner autonomy, teacher education, critical pedagogies, and qualitative research methodologies. He regularly presents at symposiums, conducts PD workshops, reviews scholarly articles and examines MA Students.

Title: Integrating Technology to Enhance Student Learning and Motivation

Abstract: The teaching fraternity has experienced significant challenges over the past two years and is now engaging in face-to-face teaching post-COVID. One of the challenges for teachers is engaging the students and motivating them to learn and stay focused in the classroom. Through a technology-enhanced session simulation, the presenter will demonstrate how she has utilised this interactive platform with foundation/-level students at a public university in Oman. Participants will be allowed to experience the first-hand benefits of technology-enhanced learning and observe the numerous benefits it offers.

Bio-note: Dr Fatemeh Ranjbaran received her PhD in TEFL from the University of Tehran in 2017. She is currently an English instructor and Academic Coordinator at UTAS-Niwa in Oman. This keynote address will discuss the multiple roles of teachers and the issues of teachers' engagement with research. These are essential if we are to help students develop effective 21st-century skills and knowledge of technology and prepare them to be competent users of the English language and socially responsible citizens.

Title: Effective Student Feedback in Higher Education

Abstract : There are many challenges that researchers investigate in the teaching-learning relationship.

One of these is student feedback. Feedback is one of the most misunderstood concepts in HE and it is also one of the ignored aspects of teaching (Winstone and Boud, 2022). Due to increasing concerns around student feedback, there has been a noticeable rise in the number of studies on student feedback since the early 2000s (Carless, 2021). Studies in general report the prevalent problems and offer practical solutions. The aim of the talk is to highlight the major concerns and challenges around student feedback and share solutions suggested by top researchers in the field on how to overcome these challenges and give more effective feedback to students.

Bio-note: Dr Misida Al Jahwari is an Assistant Professor of Organizational Change and HRM in the Department of Management, College of Economics and Political Science in Sultan Qaboos University, Oman. She has 20 years of teaching experience in HE. She teaches Organizational Change, Organizational Theory and Design and HRM courses at undergraduate and postgraduate levels. She supervises postgraduate research, serves as an external examiner in and outside the SQU, and reviews academic programs for licensing purposes. Dr Misida is a member of national level and SQU level committees and is currently managing the restructuring of SQU (2021-2025).

Bio-note : At the sound of a school bell, Eva Grayzel's life changed. She was pursuing a career as an actress in New York City while intercepting boredom at an after-school program using interactive stories. One day, the principal came into the room furious, "Didn't you hear the bell ring?" she demanded. "This delay has caused a traffic jam!" Students protested, "Wait! Tell us the rest of the story." This was unprecedented – students begging to stay after the bell. Within 5 years, Eva's interactive storytelling techniques were seen nationwide at school assembly programs, educational keynotes at Professional Day symposiums and Teacher-In-Service program.

Title: Simulated Environment Technology and EFL Students' Engagement and Communicative Competence

Sub-theme: Innovations in Language Learning

Proposal type: Paper

Abstract: This study will assess the differential effects of utilizing John's Shopping™, a task-based simulated environment software for language learning, on EFL learners' engagement and communicative competence. To this end, 350 students will be randomly selected and divided into two research groups called classic groups and simulated environment groups. Based on the treatment and assessment, their performance will be analyzed and their level of engagement will be evaluated through semi-structured interviews.

Abstract: The present study shows the effects of online Task-Based Learning on the acquisition of grammar topics in an EFL context. It discusses Willis's (1996, 2012) TBL methodology, which focuses on using tasks developed in three stages: pre-task, task cycle, and language focus. The experiment was carried out in a private school in one of the biggest cities of Ecuador with 61 participants. The findings are based on the result of pre and post-test between two groups through the SPSS program. This study proves that Willis' TBL framework has a positive effect on online teaching and helps develop and engage communicative language teaching.

Abstract: This study explores employers' views on the current English communication skills of higher education institutions graduates in Oman and identifies the workplace communication challenges encountered by graduates of these institutions. The study used a mixed-method approach. The findings revealed that Omani graduates face many challenges in the workplace, including low proficiency in English, lack of research skills and persuasive skills, and inappropriate use of language during meetings and events.

Description: The session will start with defining the concept of employability. Then, it will define Communication skills which cover two areas of competency: linguistic skills and professional communication skills. After that, the session will highlight the methodology of the study. This study used a mixed-methods approach. First, a questionnaire was distributed to 50 employers in different government and private sectors. Second, semi-structured interviews were conducted with 15 employers. Then the study will shed light on the main results. The study will end up with recommendations for HEIs to improve students' communication skills.

Abstract: Writing for academic research is challenging for most ESL/EFL novice researchers. This study aims to determine students' needs and shed light on their writing difficulties for research purposes. In the current study, there were 49 EFL participants who were pursuing their master's in the field of Linguistics from M'sila University, Algeria. Their responses to a Likert-scale questionnaire reported that the majority of students faced writing difficulties of linguistic and epistemological nature. They also expressed their urgent need for their supervisors' assistance throughout their journey. Having students' needs and difficulties defined, this study calls for the design of writing courses in which selected contents should focus on the conventions and features of research writing genres.

Abstract: This presentation underlines the study carried out to investigate the teachers' perception of the effectiveness of Google Classroom (G.C.) using the System Usability Scale. It also shares the advantages, challenges and suggestions of using Google Classroom while conducting semi-structured interviews. The descriptive approach was used in this study; the study sample was 217 teachers from different education directorates in Oman. The final scoring on the System Usability Scale (SUS) score was 69.2 points of usability, which was 'good.' Google Classroom usability in classes was acceptable to teachers since more than 70% of school teachers found the experience of using Google Classroom was 'good'.

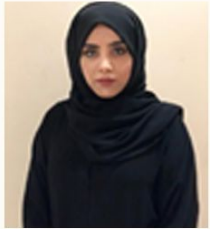

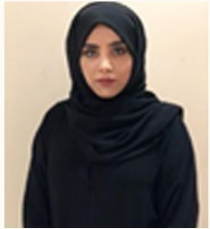

Title: Utilizing Mobile Assisted Language Learning (MALL) for Teaching English to Non-Formal Learners
